The meeting as per a statement issued to





SRINAGAR: The cold wave has tightened its grip across Kashmir with majority of the areas recording the season's coldest night including Srinagar, the summer capital of Jammu and Kashmir.

As per the details available with the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), Srinagar has recorded the season's lowest temperature at minus 4.1 degree Celsius, marking the coldest night here while Shopian in South Kashmir, was the coldest place at minus 6.6 degree Celsius.

The Meteorological department has shared the details of minimum temperature, revealing that Srinagar

has recorded a low of minus 4.1 degree Celsius against previous night's minus 2.1 degree Celsius.

Furthermore, Shopian was the coldest place in Kashmir where the mercury settled at minus 6.6 degree Celsius. Pahalgam, a famous tourist destination, recorded a low of minus 6.5 degree Celsius while Gulmarg, a famous ski-resort, recorded a low of minus 4.3 degree Celsius.

Also, Qazigund, a gateway of Kashmir, recorded a low of minus 4.4 degree Celsius while Kupwara in north Kashmir recorded minus 3.4 degree Celsius. Kokernag in South Kashmir recorded a low of minus 2.4 degree Celsius.

Uproar In RS After Rs 500 Notes Found In Singhvi's Seat, Cong MP Says 'Bizarre' Politics

NEW DELHI: Rajya Sabha Chairman Jagdeep Dhankhar on Friday said security staff had recovered a wad of Rs 500 notes from the seat allotted to Congress MP Abhishek Manu Singhvi, leading to an uproar in the House with ruling and opposition benches trading allegations and angry words.

As controversy spiralled, Singhvi said it was bizarre that politics were being raised on issues such as this and clarified that he carries only one Rs 500 note when he goes to the Rajya Sabha. "I reached inside house at 1257 pm yday and house rose at 1 pm; then I sat in canteen till 130 pm with Sh Ayodhya Rami Reddy then I left parl!" he said in a post on X.

Inside the House, the issue led to a massive row. While Leader of Opposition Mallikarjun Kharge said the chairman should not have named the member without an investigation being completed, Leader of the House J P Nadda accused the opposition of showing eagerness on "some issues" while wanting to cover up other issues

The currency was recovered from seat 222, which is allotted to Singhvi, during a routine anti-sabotage check on Thursday, Dhankhar said in the House.

The chairman said the wad has Rs 500 notes



and there appear to be 100 notes.

An investigation has been ordered in accordance with practice, Dhankhar said, adding that it was not clear if the currency notes were real or fake.

"After adjournment of the House yesterday, a wad of currency notes was apparently recovered

by security officials from seat no 222 presently allotted to Abhishek Manu Singhvi, elected from the state of Telangana," he said.

"It was my duty and I'm obliged to inform the House. This is a routine anti-sabotage check which takes place," he said.

Dhankhar added that he was expecting someone would claim the currency notes, but no one has so far. "Does it reflect the state of the economy that

people can afford to forget it," he said.
As ruckus broke out, Parliamentary Affairs
Minister Kiren Rijiju asked, "Why should there be
an objection to the name being taken? Chairman
has pointed out the seat number and the member

who occupies that. What is the problem with that?" He said carrying bundles of notes in the House is not appropriate and agreed that there should be serious investigation into the matter.

Dhankhar added that the anti-sabotage check was done in view of the security challenges.

"I have been careful that anti-sabotage checks must be very severe because in these highly technological situations where chemicals are used, the first and foremost is security... From that perspective it was done," he said.

According to Nadda, the matter was serious and the opposition and treasury benches should not be divided as it is an attack on the dignity of the House.

Taking a jibe at opposition members, he said, "On some issues you show eagerness, while you want to cover-up other issues."

Kharge objected and retorted, "Why is Mr Nadda saying we are trying to suppress the matter... You do that, we don't do that."

Union Minister Piyush Goyal also said it is a serious issue. "... we don't know what else may be found on that side," he said.

Without taking any names, Goyal accused the opposition of stalling Parliament over 'fake narratives''.

"We have been seeing session after session, on fake narratives, fake views... the Leader of Opposition and the leaders of the immoral alliance have stalled the House."

Goyal said in an apparent reference to the Congress demanding a Joint Parliamentary Committee (JPC) to probe bribery allegations against industrialist Gautam Adani.

"They base their narrative on foreign reports, and stall the House.

Is there a conspiracy in this as well? People will have to worry about the kind of give and take that happens to forward the fake narrative," he said.

Dhankhar then observed that while the Leader of Opposition has objected to a matter under investigation being debated, Goyal has suggested it should be made a general rule.

Delhi HC Refuses To Prepone Hearing On Arvind Kejriwal's Plea In Money Laundering Case

NEW DELHI: The Delhi High Court on Friday refused to advance the hearing on a petition by A chief Arvind Kejriwal challenging a trial court's order taking cognisance of a chargesheet filed against him in a money laundering case.

Justice Manoj Kumar Ohri said, "matter will be heard on the same date . I have a lot on the board to hear."

Kejriwal had sought preponement of the date of hearing on his petition from December 20.

After the court declined to change the date, Kejriwal's counsel pleaded that the Enforcement Directorate be directed to a supply



copy of its reply to the petition in advance.

"Whatever you file, give it to them also," the court told the ED's lawyer.

On November 21, the high court refused to stay at that moment the trial court proceedings against Kejriwal in the money laundering case.

The high court had issued notice and sought response of the ED on the plea by the former Delhi chief minister.

Kejriwal sought setting aside of the trial court order and argued that the cognisance of the chargesheet was taken by the special court in the absence of any sanction for his prosecution, which was required, as he was a public servant when the alleged offence was committed.

However, Solicitor General Tushar Mehta, appearing for the ED, submitted that a sanction was obtained to prosecute Kejriwal and he would be filing an affidavit.

Threat To Flights: 16 Cases Registered In Delhi Likely To Be Transferred To NIA

NEW DELHI: At least 16 cases registered in connection with threats to flights of different airlines operating from Delhi are likely to be transferred to the National Investigation Agency (NIA), officials sources said on Friday.

It has been learnt that the Delhi Police has written to the city government's home department to transfer the cases to the NIA, they said, adding that it would be further sent to the Union home ministry for final approval.

"The matter was related to national security and it has an international ramification. All these 16 cases were registered under the Suppression of Unlawful Acts against Safety of Civil Aviation (SUA SCA) Act with BNS sections and they needed deeper probe," an official source said.

In the last two weeks of October, morethan 510 domestic and international flights received bomb threats that later turned out to be hoaxes, causing major operational and financial distress for the airlines across the country. Most of the

threats were issued through social media. Police sources said 16 cases were registered in response to the threats to more than 150 domestic or international flights operating from Delhi.

The first case was registered on October 16 following a bomb threat received via X targeting a Bengaluru-bound Akasa Air "The threat messages were sent via VPN (Virtual Private Network) due to which the agencies are not able to get its exact domain or server. In some cases, the servers from which these messages were routed were located in

Union Kingdom and Germany,"



flight. The aircraft, carrying over 180 passengers, was forced to return to the national capital, they said.

The Indira Gandhi International Airport police, along with the Cyber cell, IFSO, conducted the probe into the matter but they have not got any lead into any of the cases another official source said.

The Delhi Police is also taking the help of central

taking the help of central agencies to reach out to Interpol to access further details of the domain, he added. The Delhi Police, while investigating the threat cases, also interrogated one Jagdish Shriram Uikey (35) of Gondia, Maharashtra.

Space For Different Beliefs In Democracy But Should Conform With Constitution: SC

NEW DELHI: The Supreme Courton Friday said in a democracy there was always space for different ideologies but those beliefs had to be in conformity with the Constitution.

Abench of Justices Surya Kant and Ujjal Bhuyan made the remark while refusing to entertain a PIL by an advocate seeking directions to the Centre and Bar Council of India, stating those contesting elections of bar bodies should not be a member of a political party.

"In democracy, there is always scope for different ideologies but that should be in conformity with the Constitution. There is no law, which prohibits an active member of a political party to contest the election of bar bodies. You want us to enact a law. Sorry, it can't be done," the bench said.

Senior advocate Sirajuddin, appearing for PIL petitioner advocate Jaya Sukin, said if the contesting candidates were allowed to be active members of political parties, they would push for their elections.

The bench, however, remarked, "If an office-bearer of the Bar has a political ideology, what's wrong with that? You want to oust Mr

Kapil Sibal as the president of SCBA (Supreme Court Bar Association)? You want to oust (Manan Kumar)

association with political parties will have any effect," the bench underlined.



Mishra (Rajya Sabha member from Bihar) as the chairman of the Bar Council of India?"

Justice Surya Kant referred to the contributions of legal luminary Ram Jethmalani, noting the late stalwart held the post of Bar Council of India chairperson and served as the president of the SCBA. "He was also in Parliament and was affiliated with different political parties. Do you want the country to be deprived of the views and contribution of these brilliant multi-talented persons? Bar bodies are a group of elite members of the society. We don't think that

The top court further asked when the statute was silent on this issue, how could it ask a person, associated with a political party, not to contest elections of a bar body.

"In our opinion, you should also join some political party and have some experience," Justice Kant said in lighter vein.

Sensing the mood of the court, Sirajuddin sought a direction to refer the issue to the Law Commission, but the bench said it was not going to pass any such direction and allowed the petitioner to withdraw the plea.

'Delhi Chalo' March | Farmers Stopped At Shambhu Border, Police Fire Tear Gas Shells

SHAMBHU: A 'jatha' of 101 farmers on Friday began its foot march to Delhi from their protest site at Shambhu border, but was stopped a few metres away by a multilayered barricading.

The security personnel used teargas as some farmers reached near the barricades put up on the

Haryana side of the Shambhu border.

Haryana Police asked the farmers not to proceed further and cited a prohibitory order clamped under Section 163 of the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS).

The Ambala district administration has banned any unlawful assembly of five or more persons in the district.

The farmers are marching to force the Centre for a legal guarantee for minimum support price for crops.

A few farmers holding farmers' unions' flags

pushed the iron mesh, put up by the security personnel, down the bridge constructed over the Ghaggar River. The Haryana government on Friday suspended mobile internet and bulk SMS service in 11 villages

of Ambala district till December 9. The ban was enforced in Dangdehri, Lohgarh, Manakpur, Dadiyana, Bari Ghel, Lhars, Kalu Majra, Devi Nagar, Saddopur, Sultanpur, and Kakru villages

Chanting 'Satnam Waheguru' and holding farmers unions' flags and carrying essential items, the 'jatha' crossed the initial layer barricades easily but could not proceed further.

Hindutva Played Key Role, Counter-Polarisation Helped Mahayuti Win In Maharashtra: CM Fadnavis

MUMBAI: Maharashtra Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis has said that Hindutva played an important role in the recent state assembly elections, and counter-polarisation helped the Mahayuti alliance score a big win.



Fadnavis, who took oath as Maharashtra Chief Minister for the third time on Thursday, said in an interview to ABP news channel that Hindutva and development are two sides of the same coin

and described BJP's Hindutva as a way of life. He also alleged that opposition Maha Vikas Aghadi (MVA) alliance had an agreement with people like (Islamic scholar) Sajjad Nomani, wherein it was agreed to withdraw cases of riots filed against Muslims since 2012. During the election campaign, Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath had raised the "batenge toh katenge" (divided we are destroyed) slogan, which was followed by Prime Minister Narendra Modi's "ek hain toh safe hain" (united we are safe) call.

While campaigning Fadorwis had countered

While campaigning, Fadnavis had countered the purported appeal by Nomani for a "vote-jihad" against the Mahayuti government by making a pitch for "dharma-yudh of votes". In the interview, Fadnavis said, "The voter

In the interview, Fadnavis said, "The voter turnout increased because Congress tried to suppress Hindus. When you try to suppress someone, they rise strongly. Hindutva played an important role and counter-polarisation helped the Mahayuti alliance. Our development schemes and Hindutva worked. Hindutva and development are two sides of the same coin."

The voter turnout in this year's assembly polls was 66.05 per cent, up from 61.1 per cent in 2019.

"RIP's Hindutya is a way of life and not related

"BJP's Hindutva is a way of life and not related to religious rituals. Muslims have different religious rituals. One should not have a narrow-minded

view of Hindutva," Fadnavis said. Through his actions, PM Modi has shown what inclusive Hindutva is, he added.

"Those who used to be scared of going to temples for fear of losing Muslim votes, are now frequently visiting them," he said in an apparent dig at Congress Rahul Gandhi.

BJP had planned to go ahead with Govt swearing-in without Shinde if he remained stubborn: Raut MUMBAI: Shiv Sena (UBT) leader Maharashtra despite having a massive

MUMBAI: Shiv Sena (UBT) leader Sanjay Raut on Friday claimed that Eknath Shinde had to take oath as Maharashtra Deputy Chief Minister because the BJP's



top brass planned to go ahead with the new Government's swearing-in if he continued being "stubborn". Talking to reporters in New Delhi, Raut said the state government did not have a full cabinet so far despite the Mahayuti getting a thumping majority indicates that not everything is well within the alliance.

He said it took as many as 15 days for the BJP to form the Government in

Maharashtra despite having a massive mandate.

"Eknath Shinde had to take oath as deputy Chief Minister. BJP had planned to go ahead with the swearing-in ceremony without Eknath Shinde. Had he maintained the stubborn attitude to pressure the BJP, its brass had informed (the state leadership) to go ahead without him," Raut claimed.

BJP leader Devendra Fadnavis was sworn in as Chief Minister of the state for the third time in a grand ceremony held at Azad Maidan in Mumbai on Thursday evening. Former chief minister Ekanth Shinde and Ajit Pawar took oath as deputy Chief Ministers. The event was attended by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Union Ministers and Chief Ministers of NDA-ruled states. Shinde was earlier unwilling to serve as the deputy CM, but joined after insistence from the BJP and his party MLAs. He had maintained silence whether he would be part of the new Government or not. It was only a few hours before the swearing-in ceremony that a Shiv Sena MLA confirmed that Shinde would take oath as the deputy CM.

NEW DELHI: Congress leader Priyanka Gandhi Vadra lashed out at the BJP on Friday over its leader Sambit Patra calling Leader of Opposition Rahul Gandhi a "traitor".

She asserted that nothing is above the country for her brother.

She said the accusation was nothing new coming from such people as those who called former prime ministers traitors.

"Those who can call Jawaharlal Nehru, who spent 13 years in jail during the Independence struggle, a traitor, those who can call Indira Gandhi, who broke Pakistan into two, a traitor, and those who can call Rajiv Gandhi, who was martyred for the country, a traitor, then if they are doing the same with Rahul Gandhi then there is nothing new in it," Priyanka told reporters outside the Parliament building.

"I am proud of my brother, for my brother, nothing is above the country," she said as she participated in the opposition's protest over the Adani issue. Referring to his Bharat Jodo Yatra, Priyanka said her brother walked 4,000 kms from Kanniyakumari to Kashmir



for the unity of this country.

She also alleged that the BJP did not have the courage to discuss the Adani issue in Parliament.

"They don't have the courage to discuss the Adani issue (in Parliament). Why is there a problem in discussion... discussion happens in democracy only, they are afraid of it as well," she said.

The project was approved under the Defence Acquisition Council's (DAC) Mission Mode framework, which emphasizes critical projects with strategic importance. With a planned range of over 1,000 km, the LRLACM is designed to meet the evolving needs of India's armed forces, offering unparalleled precision in long-range strikes.

The LRLACM's design incorporates cuttingedge technology, state-of-the-art avionics, and advanced software. Its versatility is evident

in its ability to be launched from both mobile ground platforms and frontline naval ships using the Universal Vertical Launch Module (UVLM). This capability enhances its operational flexibility, allowing it to adapt to diverse combat scenarios.

One of the standout features of the missile is its ability to perform complex maneuvers while flying at varying speeds and altitudes. This, coupled with its subsonic speed and terrain-following capabilities, makes it exceptionally difficult to detect and intercept,

from globally renowned cruise missiles like the U.S. Tomahawk and Russia's Kalibr, both known for their precision in long-range strikes. However, India's LRLACM stands out due to its indigenous development, with almost all components, except for a few sensors and accelerometers, being locally sourced. This self-reliance reduces dependency on foreign technology and underscores the strength of India's defense manufacturing sector.

Long-range land-attack cruise missiles are a crucial component of modern military arsenals, enabling stand-off strikes on strategic targets from safe distances. This capability ensures the safety of launch platforms and operating personnel while delivering devastating effects on high-value targets.

The LRLACM's design draws inspiration

During the inaugural test flight, the LRLACM was closely monitored using an array of advanced sensors, including radars, electrooptical tracking systems, and telemetry equipment along its flight path. The missile's seamless execution of mission objectives was a testament to the robustness of its design and development.

Future plans include around 20 additional test flights to further refine the missile's performance and reliability. These tests will focus on enhancing its range, accuracy, and terminal homing capabilities. Once the trials are completed, the Indian Navy is expected to procure approximately 200 units of the missile, valued at around 5,000 crore. This procurement will significantly boost the Navy's strike capabilities, particularly in scenarios requiring sea-skimming attacks.

Lethal Smog: Pollution surge fuels stroke cases

ir pollution has long been recognized as a significant contributor to respiratory and cardiovascular diseases. However, growing evidence now highlights its alarming connection to stroke, one of the leading causes of death and disability worldwide.

The recent surge in pollution levels across North India has underscored this link, with deteriorating air quality posing severe risks to public health, including an increased incidence

How Pollution Contributes to Stroke

Stroke occurs when blood flow to the brain is interrupted due to a clot or bleeding, leading to brain cell damage. While lifestyle factors like poor diet and sedentary habits are well-established stroke risk factors, air pollution has emerged as a silent yet potent contributor.

Fine particulate matter, nitrogen dioxide, and other pollutants can infiltrate the bloodstream, causing inflammation and oxidative stress. These processes damage blood vessels, accelerate atherosclerosis (narrowing of arteries), and raise blood pressure, all of which heighten the risk of ischemic and haemorrhagic strokes.

Studies suggest that even short-term exposure to high pollution levels can trigger strokes in vulnerable individuals, while prolonged exposure significantly increases the lifetime risk.

The Situation in North India

North India, particularly during the winter months, experiences hazardous pollution levels due to a combination of factors such as stubble burning, vehicular emissions, and industrial discharge. Cities like New Delhi and its surrounding



regions frequently record air quality indices (AQIs)

in the "severe" category. This toxic air is not only affecting the lungs but is also contributing to a marked rise in stroke cases. Neurology departments across hospitals in North India report a surge in stroke-related admissions during high pollution periods. Patients with pre-existing conditions, such as hypertension or diabetes, are particularly susceptible to pollutioninduced strokes.

Vulnerable Groups and Immediate Impact

Children, the elderly, and individuals with pre-existing cardiovascular conditions are most vulnerable to the effects of pollution. Pregnant women exposed to high pollution levels may also face increased risks of complications that could affect both maternal and foetal health, including the likelihood of strokes.

In urban areas with poor air quality, people are often unknowingly inhaling pollutants that compromise their cardiovascular systems over time. Short-term spikes in pollution levels, such as during festive seasons or crop residue burning,

can act as immediate triggers for strokes, leading to emergency situations in hospitals.

Mitigating the Risks

Tackling the pollution-stroke connection requires both individual and collective action. At a policy level, stricter regulations on emissions, better public transport systems, and promoting cleaner energy sources are critical.

On an individual level, people can minimize exposure by wearing masks, using air purifiers, and avoiding outdoor activities during high-pollution

Healthcare professionals emphasize the importance of regular health check-ups, especially for those in high-risk groups, to monitor blood pressure, cholesterol, and other stroke risk factors. Raising public awareness about the link between air pollution and strokes is equally vital to encourage proactive measures.

District Magistrate Jammu sets deadline for surrendering excess firearm(s) by licensees

JAMMU: District Magistrate Sachin Kumar Vaishya has issued an order directing all firearm license holders of Jammu district to comply with the provisions of the Arms (Amendment) Act 2019.

As per the Act, no individual is permitted to possess more than two firearms.

According to the order, the identified license holders owning more than 2 firearms must surrender their additional weapons within one week.

These license holders are instructed to deposit their other firearm at the nearest police station or authorized unit armory, in case of Armed Forces members of the Union.

Upon surrender, they must also ensure proper endorsement on their licenses, to avoid cancellation and further legal action under the Arms Act.

This step follows previous directives issued on June 28, 2022 and July 18, 2022, requiring licensees to reduce their firearms to permissible limits.

Psyllium and prunes are proven treatments for chronic constipation. Healio.com reports that Asian studies have found that kiwifruit may also benefit chronic constipation symptoms. Healio magazine reports about a partially randomised, comparative effectiveness trial evaluating kiwi fruit, psyllium, and prunes in US patients with chronic constipation.

A study published in the American Journal of Gastroenterology reports that patients with chronic constipation who received kiwi fruit, prunes and psyllium reported relief in

"Patients are increasingly seeking evidencebased natural treatments for many medical conditions, including (chronic constipation)," Samuel W Chey, MPH, from the University of Michigan and colleagues wrote. "Many patients believe that natural products are safer and less costly than prescription medications. Along these lines, so-called 'functional foods' are growing in popularity. This study confirms the benefits of prunes and psyllium and offers the first US data for green kiwifruit as a safe,

effective and well-tolerated treatment for a subset of patients with chronic constipation" How the study was conducted:

79 adults with chronic constipation at the US Medical Center were randomly assigned to one of three natural treatments

The period of observation was to be 4

29 patients consumed two green kiwi fruit per day

24 consumed 100 g of prunes per day and 22 consumed 12 g of psyllium per day All these foods contain fibre in the proportion of 6 g/d

After the 4-week treatment period, patients entered into a 2-week observation

All eligible patients had three or fewer complete spontaneous bowel movements (CSBM)

The proportion of patients in each group reporting an increase of one or more CSBM compared with baseline for at least 2 of 4 treatment weeks served as the primary

Other outcomes included stool frequency, stool consistency and straining evaluated daily. Investigators also measured treatment satisfaction and adverse events:

Proportions of complete spontaneous bowel movements were similar for the three treatments, according to the researchers.

"For secondary outcomes comparing treatment weeks 3 and 4 to baseline, there was a significant increase in weekly CSBM rate with all three treatments (P = .003); stool consistency significantly improved with kiwi fruit (P = .01) and prunes (P = .049); and straining significantly improved with kiwi fruit(P = .003), prunes (P < .001), and psyllium (P = .04)," the investigators wrote.

Bloating scores improved among patients assigned to kiwi fruit (P = .02). According to researchers, adverse events were most common with psyllium and the least common kiwi fruit. When treatment ended, investigators noted fewer patients were dissatisfied with kiwi fruit vs. prunes or psyllium (P = .02), reports Healio.com (https:// www.healio.com/news/



Amid Prolonged Dry Spell, Kashmir **Grapples With Declining Water Levels**

SRINAGAR: The Kashmir valley is facing a concerning decline in water levels across its rivers, springs, and other water bodies due to the ongoing dry spell and insufficient precipitation. Experts and officials

are raising alarms about the potential long-term impacts on drinking water, irrigation, and the valley's overall ecosystem.While the officials report a stable drinking water supply in the region, primarily attributing to reduced seasonal demand. However, the lack of significant precipitation continues to pose a long-term challenge, with authorities stressing the need for immediate rainfall and snowfall to recharge water bodies.

RBI opts for a 'wait and watch' mode: Sakshi Gupta

SRINAGAR: Principal Economist HDFC Bank, Sakshi Gupta has said that the RBI opted for a wait and watch mode in today's policy, keeping its stance and policy rate unchanged as expected. The central bank successfully engineered a fine balance in its communication between the need to remain cautious on growth while achieving price stability. The growth forecast was revised down by 60bps to 6.6% while inflation was revised up to 4.8% for 2024-25. 'We expect GDP growth to average at 6.4% in FY25, with some pick-up in momentum in the second half of the year.'

She said the more substantive announcement in today's policy came in terms of the support for liquidity conditions through a CRR cut of 50bps, which is estimated to add INR 1.1 lakh crore of liquidity to the system. Banking system liquidity has come under pressure in recent days on account of tax outflows, foreign outflows and higher currency leakage. "We expect the RBI to continue providing more "durable" support for liquidity through various measures



including longer-duration fine tuning operations, Open Market Operations, and sterilising its FX interventions."

Sakshi Gupta said that a February rate cut remains on the table, especially if growth momentum fails to pick-up meaningfully over the coming weeks. That said, a rise in global uncertainty and pressure on the rupee or domestic inflation could nudge the RBI to delay any rate cuts to the April policy – preferring prudence and patience over pre-emptive action.(KNT)

Apple Growers Face Losses as Rates Plummet Again

SRINAGAR: Apple growers in Jammu and Kashmir are once again grappling with losses as apple prices plummet in Indian markets.

Speaking to news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), growers from various regions expressed concern over reduced production this year due to hailstorm damage, which compounded their financial woes. While initial demand for apples was strong, a subsequent sharp decline in prices worsened their situation.

"During the festival season, prices surged, providing some respite, but they have fallen again in recent weeks, leaving us facing losses," lamented the growers.

Basit Ahmad Bhat, a grower from Shopian,

explained that demand was robust at the start of the season but later dwindled. leading to a market downturn of about

"For a brief period, prices rose again, but now they are falling with each passing day," he said, attributing the downturn to the bulk import of apples from countries like Iran and Afghanistan.

"Growers are struggling as the costs of labor, transportation, and packaging materials have skyrocketed, while apple prices have dropped. Many are unable to even recover their expenses." Bhat added.

According to the guidelines issued by the J&K's DMRRR department, a copy of which also lies with the news agency-Kashmir News Observer (KNO), the guidelines focus on safety measures for individuals, animals, and crops to mitigate the risks associated with severe cold weather.

During the cold wave phase, the advisory has asked residents in the region to limit outdoor exposure and dress in multiple layers of clothing. It has also insisted on using protective gear like hats, mufflers, and insulated shoes.

"Stay indoors as much as possible and minimize travel to prevent exposure to cold. Maintain warmth through healthy food, hot drinks, and proper hydration. Keep yourself dry. If wet then cover your head, neck, hands and toes adequately as the majority of heat loss occurs through these body parts. Change wet clothes immediately," reads the advisory.

The advisory has also flagged to take care of elderly people, newborns and children and check neighbours who live alone, especially the elderly about their wellbeing.

"Cover your head as most body heat is lost through the top of the head. Drink hot fluids regularly, as this will maintain body heat to fight cold," reads the advisory.

Before the cold wave, the advisory recommended staying updated on weather forecasts through radio, TV, and newspapers. It has also asked to stock essential items, including winter clothing, food, water, and emergency supplies.

"Ensure doors and windows are properly sealed to block cold vinds." states the DMRRR advisory

In case of exposure to cold wave conditions, and to address frostbite and hypothermia, the advisory has stated to promptly warm affected areas and seek medical attention and not to ignore shivering, stating that It is the first sign that the body is losing heat.

The advisory has asked to avoid alcohol, stating that it reduces body temperature.

With regard to the agricultural and animal husbandry guidelines, the advisory states that farmers should irrigate plants lightly to protect crops and use mulch to preserve warmth.

The advisory reads that cultivating frost-resistant varieties and sheltering fields with windbreaks are recommended.

"Mulching nursery beds of soil near the main trunk with black or silver plastic sheets increase radiation absorption and provide a warmer thermal regime during winter. In case plastic mulch is not available, making thatches (jhuggis) of straw or Sarkanda grass or organic mulching will also protect crops from cold," reads

For animals, the advisory states that livestock and poultry should be sheltered indoors, provided with bedding materials, and fed high-quality forage to meet increased energy demands during cold weather.

It also states that during Cold waves animals and livestock require more food for sustenance as the energy requirement goes up. It adds that extreme variations in temperature may affect the fertility rate animals, during the optimum breeding season for buffaloes /cattle.

"Cover the animal habitat from all sides during night in order to avoid direct exposure of animals to cold winds. Apply some bedding materials such as dry straw under animals during winters. Avoid giving cold feed and cold water to the animals," states the advisory.

KPDCL Waives

Discom in full or in equal instalments in the remaining 04 months to claim the waiver on late payment surcharge to settle their claims," she added.

McSweeney, Labuschagne blunt India after Starc sizzles on Australia's day

ritchell Starc's sizzling spell with the pink ball headlined the open-Ling day of the day-night Test in Adelaide as Australia responded to their 295-run drubbing in Perth by dismissing India for 180. Jasprit Bumrah then got rid of Usman

The first ball from Starc was a portent for what was to follow. He struck in the first over of each of his three spells, asserting his supremacy in pink-ball Tests. He came away with career-best Test figures of 6 for 48, which extended his pink-ball tally in Australia to 72.



Khawaja in the twilight but the under-pressure Marnus Labuschagne and rookie opener Nathan McSweeney navigated a tricky passage of play to guide Australia to stumps without any further damage. Their unbroken 62-run partnership helped Australia cut their deficit to under 100 and ensured that the first day belonged to them.

It is twice as many as Pat Cummins (36) has taken and 29 more than what Nathan Lyon, Starc's closest contender in pink-ball Test cricket in the country, has managed.

It all started with that first ball to Yashasvi Jaiswal, who had told Starc that he was "coming on too slow" in Perth. On Friday in Adelaide, Starc let rip a full, fast one that threatened to

angle down leg before swerving back into the line of the stumps and seaming in the other direction off the pitch to beat the attempted flick and thud into front pad. It was so plumb that Jaiswal didn't even bother to review. Starc roared at the departing Jaiswal and had over 36,000 spectators - the biggest crowd for an India-Australia Test in Adelaide - roaring

Shubman Gill, who returned to India's Test XI after missing the Perth Test with a hand injury, and KL Rahul then briefly settled India's innings with a 69-run stand for the second wicket. Gill showed little signs of rust and laid into drives whenever Australia's quicks veered away from their lengths and the stumps.

At the other end, Rahul was more circumspect, playing out Cummins for three maidens, before fending at Scott Boland's first ball, which reared up to threaten the shoulder of his bat. Rahul walked off, thinking he had nicked it behind but a front-foot no-ball from Boland earned him a reprieve. There was nothing on the Snicko either. Five balls later, Boland hit Rahul's outside edge but Khawaja grassed the chance at first slip.

Rahul's luck, however, ran out when Starc returned for his second spell and struck with his fourth ball. He extracted extra bounce and had Rahul edging to gully for 37 off 64 balls. In his next over, Starc took out Virat Kohli for seven off eight balls with a similar prancing delivery. Soon after, Boland nipped one into Gill's pads as India lost 3 for 12 in a chaotic 15-minute period before the dinner break.

India's slump continued after resumption. with Boland pinning Rohit Sharma's pads this time. Playing in his first Test match in over a year, in place of the injured Josh Hazlewood, Boland kept it on a good length, or just back of it, and kept gleaning seam movement. Rohit, who had slid down the order to No. 6 to accommodate Rahul at the top alongside Jaiswal, fell for 3 off 23 halls

Cummins then joined the fun when he bounced Rishabh Pant out, with a back-of-alength delivery that kicked up at his ribs, for 21 off 35 balls. It meant so much to Cummins that he celebrated it with a big roar. The Australia captain had looked underdone in Perth and wasn't at his sharpest with the new ball on Friday, but redeemed himself with the big scalp of Pant.

Despite wickets falling at the other end, Nitish Kumar Reddy remained unfazed and rolled out the big hits. When Starc pitched one too full, Reddy audaciously drilled him over extra-cover for six and in the next over he lined up Boland for a sequence of 6,4,6. The first six was jaw-dropping reverse-swat over the slip cordon, which cleared one of the biggest boundaries at the ground at deep third. It even put a smile on Bumrah's face, but the joy was short-lived as Starc combined with Cummins to wrap up India's innings.

After having top-scored for India in his debut innings in Perth, Reddy did the same in the first innings in Adelaide, finishing with 42 off 54 balls, including three fours and a six. Reddy was the last Indian batter to be dismissed, with Starc having him hole out to mid-off.

Suryavanshi fifty drives India to U-19 **Asia Cup final**

▼aibhav Suryavanshi starred with a second successive half-century as India stormed into the Under-19 Asia Cup final with a comprehensive seven-wicket victory over Sri Lanka in Sharjah on Friday.

The 13-year-old, who became the youngest cricketer ever to be bought at an IPL auction last month, smashed five sixes and six fours for his 36-ball 67 as India chased down a target of 174 with as many as 170 balls to spare.

India will face Bangladesh in the final at the Dubai International Cricket Stadium on Sunday.

Bangladesh defeated Pakistan by seven wickets, completing a chase of 117 in 22.1 overs in the first semi-final in Dubai.



Opting to bat, Sri Lanka could only manage 173 in 46.2 overs despite a valiant effort from Lakvin Abeysinghe (69 off 110) and Sharujan Shanmuganathan (42 off 78).

Their innings struggled to gain momentum but Indian bowlers were in full control with Chetan Sharma (3 for 34), Kiran Chormale (2 for 32), and Ayush Mhatre (2 for 37) wreaking havoc in the middle overs

Ayush Mhatre's 34 off 28 laid a solid foundation for the chase as he put on a stand of 91 with Suryavanshi for the opening wicket.

The young left-hander from Bihar troubled the Sri Lankan bowlers from the beginning as he started with consecutive sixes and a boundary off Sigera, who ended up giving away 31 runs in his opening over.

Mhatre too played his strokes at the other end as the duo raced to 87 for no loss in eight overs before Vihas Thewmika gave Sri Lanka their first breakthrough by removing the batter.

But Suryavanshi kept the run rate ticking despite losing his opening partner, forging another crucial association with C Andre Siddharth (22).

He didn't stop there, taking the attack to the bowlers with his aggressive strokes, including scoring two sixes off Aayan Khan. Captain Mohamed Amaan (25 not out) and KP Karthikeya (11 not out) then completed the chase.
