SRINAGAR: Dense fog engulfed Kashmir Srinagar, the summer capital of Jammu & Kashmir and other parts on Friday ahead of the forecast of a major three-day snow spell in the Union Territory from Saturday, which is expected to affect the surface traffic.

According to the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), a thick layer of fog enveloped Kashmir parts this morning, delaying the flight operations at Srinagar International Airport.

Although no flight was cancelled, the operation of multiple flights was delayed this morning as the visibility fell to about 300 metres, Director Srinagar Airport, Javed Anjum said.

Katra-Srinagar train likely to chug after Jan 20 Northern Railway announces timings

SRINAGAR: The Katra-Srinagar train is likely to chug on the Udhampur-Srinagar-Baramulla Rail Link (USBRL) after January 20.

Officials told the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO) that final preparations are being made to connect Kashmir with Kanyakumari through a railway network.

In connection with train to Kashmir the Railway Ministry has decided to set up a new division with headquarters at Jammu under the Northern Railway Zone by reorganising the Firozpur division.

The Jammu division, according to the officials, is proposed to have five sections - Pathankot-Jammu-Udhampur, Srinagar-Baramulla, Bhogpur Sirwal-Pathankot, Batala (excluding)-Pathankot, and Pathankot-Joginder Nagar. The combined length of the section will be 742.1 km.



According to railway officials, there are currently 68 rail divisions under 17 railway zones and Jammu will become the 69th division.

NIA court convicts 28 for murder during 2018 Kasganj Tiranga Yatra

LUCKNOW: A special NIA court here has convicted 28 persons in connection with the murder of Chandan Gupta, who was shot dead in a communal clash that broke out during a 2018 Tiranga Yatra in Kasganj.

Special judge Vivekanand Sharan Tripathi said that the sentence will be announced on Friday. The accused were convicted on charges of murder, attempted murder, rioting and insulting the national flag on Thursday.

The case has drawn significant attention after Chandan Gupta's death sparked riots in the region.

The National Investigation Agency (NIA) court also acquitted Nasiruddin and Asim Qureshi, citing a lack of sufficient evidence to convict them.

On the morning of January 26, 2018, Chandan Gupta and his brother Vivek Gupta took part in a Tiranga Yatra. When the procession reached near the Government Girls Inter College gate on Tehsil Road, a group, including Salim, Wasim and Naseem, allegedly blocked the road and stopped the procession, a government counsel said.

When Chandan objected, the situation escalated and stone-pelting began from the side of the accused, the lawyer said.

Salim, one of the main accused, shot Chandan, seriously injuring him, he said. Despite the grave injury, Vivek and their companions managed to rush Chandan to the Kasganj police station,



from where he was immediately transferred to the district hospital where he was declared dead shortly after arrival.

The murder of Chandan led to widespread riots in Kasganj for three days, fueling communal tensions in the region.

Chandan's father Sushil Gupta lodged a murder complaint. In September 2019, the Kasgani Sessions

Court framed charges against 23 individuals. Later, in November 2019, charges were framed against an additional seven persons.

The charges included Sections 147 (rioting), 148 (rioting with deadly weapons), 307/149 (attempted murder), 302/149 (murder), 341 (wrongful restraint), 336 (endangerment), 504 (intentional insult), 506 (criminal intimidation), and Section 124K (insult to national flag) of the Indian Penal Code. Additionally, several of the accused faced charges under the Arms Act for possession of firearms.

The trial was transferred to the Lucknow

court after initial proceedings in Kasganj.

After Thursday's conviction, Chandan's parents said they had faith in the judicial process. "We have full faith in the court, and we will be satisfied with whatever verdict is given," said Chandan's father, Sushil Gupta. However, he also voiced his frustration with the lack of support from political leaders.

He said none of these promises made by BJP leaders have been fulfilled, which included the construction of a square in Chandan's name and the provision of a government job for a member of his family.

"My son is getting justice from the court, but the government leaders have failed to deliver on their promises," Sushil Gupta added.

Out of the 28 convicted, 26 were present in court, while one, Munajir Rafi, appeared via video conferencing from jail. The court issued an arrest warrant for another accused, Salim, who was absent from the proceedings.

The accused were taken into judicial custody after the verdict and were sent to jail.

Salim, Wasim, Naseem, Mohsin, Rahat, Bablu and Salman have also been convicted under the Arms Act for carrying weapons during the incident. The prosecution, led by government lawyers MK Singh and LK Dixit, presented 18 witnesses, while the defence brought forward 23 witnesses during the trial.

Border areas, remote villages in Ladakh digitally connected: Army

NEW DELHI: Sustained efforts by the Army, in collaboration with telecom service providers, in the past five months has brought border areas and remote villages in Ladakh, including remote locations of Kargil and Siachen, on the digital connectivity map.

In a post on X on Thursday, the Indian Army also shared a video of this journey and glimpses of the change it has brought to the lives of local people in the region.

In its post captioned 'Indian Army for India's First Villages: Bringing Connectivity & Hope to Remote Areas', the Army said the border areas and remote villages in Ladakh were "devoid of 4G mobile connectivity" until June 2024.

"This was depriving the local communities from being connected to the digital revolution in the nation. The Indian Army in collaboration with Bharti Airtel set out to ensure connectivity in these First Villages of India," it said. The Army further said the Leh-based Fire and Fury Corps "proactively engaged all the telecom service providers" and assisted them in installation of mobile towers in theses remote areas.

"Fighting against the harsh weather including sub-zero temperatures, a total of 42 Airtel 4G mobile towers have been installed in 5 months covering the remote locations of Kargil, Siachen, Demchok, DBO and Galwan providing much needed connectivity to the populace as well as soldiers serving in Ladakh," it said in its post.

"This initiative will boost tourism in the state and help the local community by improving access to online education, remote healthcare and fostering economic opportunities through government schemes bridging the existing digital divide.

"Indian Army is committed to fostering holistic development of First Villages located in remote areas to achieve our national vision of #ViksitBharat by 2047," the Army said.

40 pc girl cadets in NCC, phase-wise expansion planned for Corps



NEW DELHI: The strength of girl cadets in the NCC has risen to 40 per cent and a phase-wise expansion has been planned for the Corps in the next few years, senior officials said on Friday.

At a press briefing here, Director General, National Cadet Corps, Lt Gen Gurbirpal Singh shared details about the ongoing NCC Republic Day Camp at Delhi Cantonment and the future

A total of 2,361 NCC cadets from across the country are taking part in a month-long Republic Day camp which began on December 30. The annual event will also witness the participation of 917 girl cadets, the largest so far.

Out of 2,361 NCC cadets, 114 are from Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh and 178 from the northeast region.

The DG, NCC told reporters that cadets from than 15 friendly foreign countries are set to take part in the camp.

"We began it with a Sarva Dharma Pooja for well-being of all... This year we also have a new category of competition ideas and innovation," he said. Asked about the expansion plan and the strength of girl cadets in the NCC, the top official said, the sanctioned strength of the Corps is 20 lakh, and the current strength at present is 17 lakh. The share of girl cadets in the total strength is 40 per cent, he said. A senior official, on the sidelines of the briefing, said the strength of girl cadets has risen manifold in the last 10 years, and a phase-wise expansion has been planned for the NCC.

Reference to Sanatan, Hindu evokes baffling reaction in India: Dhankhar

on Friday lamented that reference to Sanatan and Hindu in India evokes baffling reaction from "misguided" people. He also said that people who react to these terms without understanding the depths of the words and their deep meaning are "misguided" souls driven by a "dangerous ecosystem".Addressing the International Congress of Vedanta organised at JNU here, Dhankhar said it was ironical and painful that in this country

"reference to Sanatan, reference to Hindu evokes baffling reaction beyond comprehension."

"Rather than understand the depth of these words, their deep meaning, people tend to be in a reaction mode at the drop of a hat," he said.

Dhankhar dubbed such people as "souls which are misguided themselves". He said such persons are "driven by a dangerous ecosystem that is a threat not only to society but to themselves".

The vice president said at a time when global disciplines are embracing the Vedanta philosophy, there are "some in this land of spirituality", who dismiss Vedanta and Sanatani text as "regressive".

"This dismissal often stems from perverted, colonial mindsets, inefficient understanding of our intellectual heritage. These elements work in a structured manner, in a sinister fashion,' the vice president said.

CJI Praises Retiring SC Judge Justice Ravikumar As 'Humane And Noble Soul'

NEW DELHI: Chief Justice of India Sanjiv Khanna on Friday lauded Supreme Court judge Justice CT Ravikumar on his last working day, describing him as a "humane and noble soul" whose journey from a humble rural background to the apex court was nothing short of extraordinary.

Justice Ravikumar was elevated to the top court on August 31, 2021, after an illustrious tenure at Kerala High Court.

He is the ninth senior-most judge in the apex

As he prepares to superannuate on Sunday, the ceremonial bench comprising Chief Justice of India (CJI) Khanna, Justice Ravikumar and Justice Sanjay Kumar bid an emotional farewell, celebrating his contributions and legacy.

"Coming from a rural background and achieving the distinction of serving as a judge of the Supreme Court is a remarkable accomplishment. Justice Ravikumar has not only achieved this but also outperformed in his duties,"

remarked CJI Khanna, highlighting the challenges of rising through the ranks without the privileges of urban upbringing.

The CJI further acknowledged Justice Ravikumar's enduring impact on the judiciary, calling him an inspiration for future generations.

"He has left behind a legacy for all judges to follow. We will certainly miss him but wish him the very best in his future endeavours," he said

and added that Justice Ravikumar would continue to reside in Delhi.

In a heartfelt address, Justice Ravikumar



expressed his gratitude to the Bar for its support throughout his tenure.

"I was an advocate and that advocate remains in me. That is why I always hold the Bar in the highest respect," he said.

Several legal luminaries, including Attorney General R Venkataramani, Solicitor General Tushar Mehta and Supreme Court Bar Association (SCBA) President Kapil Sibal, paid glowing tributes to the retiring judge.

Over 100 Flights Delayed Due To Dense Fog In Delhi, Visibility Drops To Zero In Many Parts

NEW DELHI: More than 100 flights were delayed at the Delhi airport on Friday morning as visibility dropped to zero in some areas due to dense fog.

A thick blanket of fog engulfed the national capital in the morning, with the weather department predicting cloudy skies for much of the day. Delhi's minimum temperature was recorded at 7 degrees isius, the weather office said

An official said over 100 flights have been delayed at the Delhi airport due to bad weather conditions but there are no diversions so far.

"While landing and takeoffs continue at Delhi Airport, flights that are not CAT III compliant may get affected. Passengers are requested to contact the airline concerned for updated flight information. Any inconvenience caused is deeply regretted," Delhi International Airport Ltd



(DIAL) said in a post on X at 6.35 am.

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) said the IGI Airport experienced very dense fog with visibility recorded at 0 metres. It said all runways are operating under CAT-III, which allows aircraft to operate in low visibility conditions

The IGI airport handles around 1,300 flight movements

At 8 am, Palam weather station reported very dense fog with 0 metres visibility and calm winds over the past two hours, while the city's primary weather station, Safdarjung, reported visibility of 50 metres with calm winds, according to a weather department official.

The weather office has predicted very dense fog for Friday, with the maximum temperature expected to settle around 17 degrees Celsius.

UP is poised to accelerate its development in New Year: Yogi Adityanath

GORAKHPUR: Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath on Thursday said that while previous governments focused on stifling development by shutting down industries and factories, the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) led double-engine government is actively creating an environment conducive to progress through new initiatives and constructions. Speaking at the foundation stone laying and inauguration

ceremony for nine development projects worth Rs 1,533 crore in Gorakhpur, the CM highlighted examples like the revival of the Gorakhpur fertilizer factory and the Pipraich sugar mill. "Previous governments had closed these facilities and were

preparing to sell them. The double-engine government has proven they can be revitalized and made operational again," he said. Yogi emphasised that UP is poised to accelerate its development in the new year under the double-engine government. "Job and

employment opportunities will grow rapidly, ensuring our youth no longer need to migrate elsewhere for work," he said. During the event at Janta Inter College, Chargawan, the Chief Minister inaugurated five development projects worth Rs 53.74 crore and laid the foundation stone for four projects of Rs 1.478.81

crore. He said that these initiatives would further strengthen the

vision of a modern and prosperous Gorakhpur in the years to come. While highlighting the transformative changes brought by the double-engine government, he said, "During the Samajwadi Party (SP) government, children were dying in large numbers due to encephalitis. These children were the trust of society and the nation, but those who divided society along caste lines paid no attention. Tragically, 90 percent of the children who succumbed

to encephalitis belonged to Dalit and minority communities." Yogi said that under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, the double-engine government has successfully eradicated encephalitis from the state.

Referring to the development of Gorakhpur, he said, "Today's Gorakhpur reflects the vision of a modern UP and a modern India.



During the SP government, there was no electricity, no access to proper healthcare and even BRD Medical College was in a deplorable state, unable to provide adequate treatment.'

The Chief Minister said that in 1990s, the SP and Congress governments shut down the Gorakhpur fertilizer factory. "The Pipraich sugar mill was also closed, with plans underway to sell it. Roads were in such poor condition that it was hard to tell whether they were covered in potholes or the potholes were part of the road. Ramgarh Taal was nothing more than a garbage dump," he said.

Yogi said, "Now, under the double-engine government, Ramgarh Taal has become a thriving tourist destination. The Gorakhpur fertilizer factory and Pipraich sugar mill have been revived. BRD Medical College has been upgraded and AIIMS is operational in

Gorakhpur. The city is now connected with two-lane, four-lane, and six-lane roads."

He said that once the work on the Godhdhoiya Nala project is completed, the issue of waterlogging will be resolved permanently.

The CM emphasised the importance of having a passion for work and a sense of accountability toward society, stating that with these qualities, all challenges can be overcome. Yogi highlighted the significant developments in Gorakhpur, mentioning the operational Pipraich sugar mill, a functional fertilizer factory, and the newly opened zoo.

He said, "Gorakhpur now enjoys excellent road connectivity with key cities like Lucknow and Varanasi. This development has brought new employment opportunities to the region."

The CM said that over the past five years, Gorakhpur has witnessed investments worth Rs 15,000 crore to Rs 20,000 crore. "These investments have led to the establishment of industries, providing thousands of youth with guaranteed employment," he said.

Yogi said, "Today, Gorakhpur is home to four universities, and a veterinary college is also under construction, further strengthening the region's educational and economic landscape."

The Chief Minister said that this year is set to be crucial, marking the beginning of significant development works.

He mentioned that the veterinary college being established in Gorakhpur will provide training in animal husbandry. Additionally, an agricultural university is being set up in Kushinagar to offer training in modern agricultural technologies to farmers, alongside agricultural studies.

Yogi also highlighted that farmers will have the opportunity to learn new methods at the newly renovated agricultural school in Gorakhpur.

The CM said that the double-engine BJP government is drawing

'If Gulmarg Can, Why Not Gurez?': Locals Advocate for Winter Games

BANDIPORA: Blanketed in massive snowfall, Gurez Valley in north Kashmir's Bandipora district shows potential as a winter sports tourism hub, with locals urging the government to support infrastructure development in the area.

Recently a video went viral on social media in which a man from Srinagar had lost around 80 Lakh Rupees while playing online gambling on some gambling site called Teen Pati. This is the first instance in which any individual has lost such a big amount of money to this menace of gambling.

Many people in the valley have money so far on these platforms. Earlier a man from Baramulla lost 42 lakh rupees through online gambling, forcing his parents to sell their house to repay the debt. Another individual from the town gambled away 32 lakhs and now suffers from severe depression.

To quote the recent instance of a man from Srinagar, as per the reports and as per his own statement on social media, the person had invested his whole savings and had also borrowed money from friends and relatives.

This menace of online gaming as well as gambling has become a nuisance in our society. This issue needs to be brought to the limelight so that immediate public attention is sought in order to curb this menace.

Another reason why youth fall prey to such gambling apps is that many celebrities and social media influencers



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"Get Out": A Chilling Allegory of Racism, Manipulation, and Control

"Get Out" is a thought-provoking horror film that delves deeply into the themes of racism and exploitation. It portrays a family of surgeons who surgically remove the brains of Black individuals, particularly those with athletic or muscular physiques, and replace them with the brains of white people. This grotesque procedure serves as a metaphor for the broader societal issues of white supremacy and the objectification of Black bodies. The film critiques the exploitation and appropriation of Black culture and identity for the benefit of white individuals, underscoring the horrific lengths to which some might go to maintain power and control.

This thematic exploration extends beyond the confines of the film, suggesting that the family dynamics portrayed are emblematic of societal patterns observed in many real-life contexts. There are numerous families and social structures that emulate the behavior seen in the film, where individuals may foster emotional bonds as a guise to exert control or influence over others. In these situations, the family becomes the nucleus of an ideological framework, seeking to maintain a monopoly over their narrative and social standing. Those who begin to question, challenge, or rebel against these structures often face significant backlash.

When one attempts to break free from these toxic dynamics, the repercussions can be severe. The conflict that ensues is often characterized by an intense psychological struggle,

The Minister also directed the executing agencies to complete construction of PHC Pahalgam well before the commencement of SANJY 2025. She also called for robust monitoring mechanism to ensure regular evaluation of health institution performance and accountability at all levels.

Reiterating government's resolve to provide quality healthcare services, Sakeena Itoo stated, "the public has immense trust in the medical fraternity and it is our responsibility to uphold their faith through dedication, commitment as well as provision of better healthcare services".

The Minister encouraged all the stakeholders to work collaboratively to ensure successful implementation of policies aimed at improving the health and well-being of the population. She also instructed the officers to submit periodic progress reports of several ongoing projects.

New Delhi: In a landmark move towards enhancing pension services, EPFO completed $full\,scale\,rollout\,of\,the\,new\,Centralized\,Pension$ Payments System (CPPS) under Employees' Pension Scheme 1995 in December 2024. About Rs. 1570 Crore pension was disbursed to more than 68 Lakh pensioners pertaining to all 122 pension disbursing Regional offices of EPFO for December 2024.

The first pilot of the Centralized Pension Payment System (CPPS) was successfully completed in October, 2024 in Karnal, Jammu and Srinagar Regional Offices with the pension disbursement of about Rs 11 Crore to more than 49,000 EPS Pensioners. The second pilot was taken up in November, 2024 in 24 Regional Offices in which around Rs. 213 crores pension was disbursed to more than 9.3 lakh pensioners.

Announcing the successful rollout, Union Minister Dr. Mansukh Mandaviya said, "The full-scale implementation of the Centralized Pension Payments System (CPPS) across all Regional Offices of EPFO is a historic milestone. This transformative initiative empowers pensioners to access their pension seamlessly from any bank, any branch, anywhere in the country. It eliminates the need for physical verification visits and simplifies the pension disbursement process. CPPS is a testament to our commitment to modernizing EPFO services and ensuring convenience, transparency, and efficiency for our pensioners. With this rollout, we are setting a new benchmark in pension

service delivery, aligning with the vision of a tech-enabled and member-centric EPFO."

The CPPS is a paradigm shift from the existing pension disbursement system that is decentralized, with each Zonal/Regional Office



of EPFO maintaining separate agreements with only 3-4 banks. In CPPS, not only the pensioner will be able to take pension from any bank, but also, there will be no need for pensioners to visit the bank for any verification at the time of commencement of pension and the pension shall be immediately credited upon release.

The CPPS system from January 2025 onwards would also ensure disbursement of pension throughout India without any need for transfer of Pension Payment Orders (PPO) from one office to another even when the Pensioner moves from one location to another or changes his bank or branch.

Ministry of Defence: Year **End Review: 2024- Part-VI**

DEFENCE RESEARCH & DEVELOPMENT ORGAN-

DRDO conducted a successful flight-test of the New Generation AKASH (AKASH-NG) missile from the Integrated Test Range (ITR), Chandipur off the coast of Odisha on January 12, 2024. The flight-test was conducted against a high-speed unmanned aerial target at very low altitude. During the flight-test, the target was successfully intercepted by the weapon system and destroyed.

Four flight trials of High-speed Expendable Aerial Target (HEAT) - ABHYAS were successfully carried out by DRDO from the Integrated Test Range, Chandipur in Odisha during January 30 to February 02, 2024.

DRDO conducted two successful flight tests of Very Short-Range Air Defence System (VSHORADS) missile on February 28 & 29, 2024 from a ground based portable launcher off the coast of Odisha from Integrated Test Range, Chandipur. These tests were carried out against high speed unmanned aerial targets under different interception scenarios. VSHO-RADS is a Man Portable Air Defence System (MANPAD) designed and developed indigenously by Research Centre Imarat (RCI) in collaboration with other DRDO laboratories and Indian Industry Partners.

DRDO conducted first successful flight test of indigenously developed Agni-5 missile with Multiple Independently Targetable Re-Entry Vehicle (MIRV) technology. The flight test named Mission Divyastra was carried out from Dr APJ Abdul Kalam Island in Odisha.

Strategic Forces Command, along with DRDO, conducted the successful flight-test of New Generation Ballistic Missile Agni-Prime from Dr APJ Abdul Kalam Island off the coast of Odisha on April 03, 2024. The test met all the trial objectives validating its reliable performance, as confirmed from the data captured by a number of range sensors deployed at different locations, including two downrange ships placed at the terminal point.

Man Portable Anti-tank Guided Missile Weapon System, indigenously designed and developed by DRDO, has been field evaluated in different flight configurations several times with the objective of proving the technology with high superiority. The Warhead Flight Trials were successfully conducted at the Pokhran Field Firing Range, Rajasthan on April 13, 2024.

DRDO, along with researchers of IIT Delhi has developed Light Weight Bullet Proof Jackets named AB-HED (Advanced Ballistics for High Energy Defeat) in the country for protection against 7.62 x 54 R API (Level 6 of BIS 17051) ammunition. The jackets have been developed at the DRDO Industry Academia Centre of Excellence (DIA-CoE) at IIT, Delhi. This jacket is based upon new design approach, where novel material along with new processes have been used. These jackets have been created from polymers and indigenous boron carbide ceramic material.

Supersonic Missile-Assisted Release of Torpedo (SMART) system was successfully flight-tested on May 01, 2024 from Dr APJ Abdul Kalam Island off the coast of Odisha. SMART is a next-generation missile-based lightweight torpedo delivery system, designed and developed by the Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) to enhance the anti-submarine warfare capability of the Indian Navy far beyond the conventional range of lightweight torpedo.

DRDO successfully flight-tested RudraM-II air-tosurface missile from Su-30 MK-I platform of IAF off the coast of Odisha on May 29, 2024. RudraM-II is an indigenouslydeveloped solid-propelled air-launched missile system meant for Air-to-Surface role to neutralise many types of enemy assets. A number of state-of-the-art indigenous technologies developed by various DRDO laboratories have been incorporated in the missile system.

DRDO handed over the Medium Range-Microwave Obscurant Chaff Rocket to the Indian Navy at a ceremony held in New Delhi on June 26, 2024. Microwave Obscurant Chaff, a niche technology developed by DRDO's Defence Laboratory, Jodhpur, obscures radar signals and creates a microwave shield around platforms and assets, thus reducing radar detection.

DRDO successfully flight-tested Phase-II Ballistic Missile Defence System on July 24, 2024. The flight test fully met all the trial objectives validating complete network centric warfare weapon system consisting of Long Range Sensors, low latency communication system and MCC and Advance Interceptor missiles.

DRDO has carried out successful maiden flight test of Long Range Glide Bomb, GAURAV from Su-30 MK-I platform of IAF. GAURAV is an air launched 1,000 kg class glide bomb capable of hitting targets at long distance. During the flight test, the glide bomb hit the target with pinpoint accuracy.

DRDO and the Indian Navy have conducted backto-back successful flight tests of the Vertical Launch Short Range Surface to Air Missile. The missile intercepted a high-speed aerial target, flying at a very low altitude and simulating a sea-skimming threat, which showcased its precision and capability to neutralise targets. The second consecutive test was conducted on September 13, 2024, from the Integrated Test Range, Chandipur, Odisha. This follows the earlier test on September 12, 2024, when the VLSRSAM missile effectively engaged another low-altitude target.

DRDO conducted the maiden flight-test of Long Range Land Attack Cruise Missile from the Integrated Test Range, Chandipur off the coast of Odisha on November 12, 2024 from a mobile articulated launcher. During the test, all sub-systems performed as per expectation and met the primary mission objectives.

DRDO has successfully completed the Flight Tests of Guided Pinaka Weapon System as part of Provisional Staff Qualitative Requirements Validation Trials. The flight tests have been conducted in three phases at different field firing ranges. During these tests, the PSQR parameters viz., ranging, accuracy, consistency and rate of fire for multiple target engagement in a salvo mode have been assessed by extensive testing of rockets.

DRDO conducted a successful flight-trial of India's first long-range hypersonic missile from Dr APJ Abdul Kalam Island off the coast of Odisha on November 16, 2024. This hypersonic missile is designed to carry various payloads for ranges greater than 1,500 kms for the Armed Forces.

Measures to promote research include:

DRDO's Technology Development Fund (TDF) scheme encourages participation of public/private industries especially Start-ups and MSMEs to create an eco-system for enhancing the capabilities in cutting-edge technology and promoting 'Aatmanirbharta' in defence. Till date, a total of 78 projects, with a commitment of over Rs 333 crore, have been sanctioned to various industries, and 27 defence technologies have been successfully realised under the scheme.

The Dare to Dream Innovation Contest is another avenue through which DRDO promotes innovators and start-ups by encouraging disruptive ideas and concepts in emerging technologies for enhancing defence capabilities. Till date 4 Pan India Dare to Dream Innovation contest were carried out and 52 start-ups and 65 individuals have been awarded under the scheme.

DRDO provides support to academia to carry out Directed Research in the identified research areas related to Defence application through DRDO Industry Academia-Centres of Excellence (DIA-CoEs) to undertake translational projects by providing direction, technical interactions and project funding. So far, 15 DIA-CoEs have been established. They are at IIT BHU, IIT Jodhpur, IIT Kanpur, IIT Roorkee, IIT Kharagpur, IIT Hyderabad, Gujarat University, IISC Bengaluru, Jammu University, Mizoram University, IIT Delhi, IIT Bombay, IIT Madras, University of Hyderabad and Bharathiar University.

DRDO has Grants-in-Aid Scheme for S&T projects under Extramural Research and under Research Boards. It also supports Exhibitions, inter school and inter college level competitions etc. besides paid apprenticeship scheme,

2023. The entire project will be completed by November 2025.

NATIONAL CADET CORPS

Key Initiatives

ln line with ongoing efforts to expand NCC benefits to more youth, the Government approved Three Lakh Cadet Expansion Plan, which will increase the NCC's strength to 20 lakh cadets with close to 40% girl cadets, making it the largest volunteer uniformed force in the world. This initiative not only offers thousands of young people valuable leadership training, but it also creates employment opportunities for over 2,000 ex-servicemen, who will bring their expertise to mentor and guide the new cadets. Additionally, the expansion will address the demand from over 10,000 educational institutions seeking to affiliate with the NCC. The NCC Expansion plan is progressing steadily, with 30,00 Cadets enrolled under a pilot project and recruitment of 345 ex-servicemen already underway in the current year. Besides, three Army NCC units and one Air wing have also been operationalised in J&K and Ladakh. Enrolment of the remaining 2.7 Lakh cadets and hiring of 1,943 ex-servicemen will commence on 01 Apr 2025.

NCC is equipping the Amrit Peedhi with skills to realise the vision of Viksit Bharat @ 2047, Contemporary subjects like Cyber Awareness, Disaster Management, and Drone Training have been incorporated, alongside simulator training to address modern challenges. Collaborations with organisations such as DRDO, ISRO, and NPCIL provide cadets with valuable insights into advanced research and the peaceful uses of technology. Initiatives like Skill Manthan and Kaushal Camps are being organised to align cadets' capabilities with industry requirements. Similarly, Idea and Innovation Camps encourage creativity and entrepreneurship, preparing cadets to contribute towards 'Swarnim Bharat'.

In the current training year, the emphasis has been given on idea/innovation and start-up awareness to NCC Cadets. Three workshops have been conducted till date and further workshops by experts pan-India on Start-Up and Idea/Innovation is planned thereby providing the cadets an opportunity to showcase their innovative ideas and solutions to real-world challenges, emphasising the importance of entrepreneurship and teamwork. The idea/innovation competition is being conducted by all state Directorates which has engaged cadets thereby providing an opportunity to think outside the box, develop their concepts and contribute meaningfully to the NCC's mission of nation-building.

In alignment with the government's push for digital transactions, NCC has disbursed over 07 lakh cadets with Rs 298 crore digitally last year for uniform purchases to the entitled cadets. This initiative not only simplifies the process but also ensures timely transfers reinforcing NCC's commitment to modernisation.

Training

Certificate Examinations: In the training year 2023-24, a total of 6,20,564 NCC cadets appeared for the certificate examinations. Of these, 5,03,350 cadets successfully passed and were awarded NCC 'A', 'B', and 'C' certificates.

Annual Training Camp/Combined Annual Training Camps: The NCC conducted 1,162 Annual Training Camps and Combined Annual Training Camps during the year, with participation from 5,44,894 cadets, reflecting significant

engagement within the youth pan India. Centrally Organised Camps: During the year, three distinguished centrally organised camps were successfully held, the All India Thal Sainik Camp, the All India Vayu Sena Camp, and the All India Nau Sena Camp. Through rigorous training and collaborative experiences, 2,757 selected cadets not only enhanced their leadership and teamwork abilities but also deepened their national pride and shared purpose, shaping them into well-rounded individuals ready to contribute to the nation's growth.

Service Training

Army Wing Activities: As part of its annual training initiatives, the NCC Army Wing Cadets were provided with invaluable exposure to the armed forces' ethos and lifestyle through various attachment programs. A total of 21,598 cadets participated in 12 day attachment training with Army units. Additionally, 100 Senior Wing cadets attended specialised training at the Officers Training Academy (OTA), Chennai, in Oct 2024, while 250 Senior Division cadets gained experience at the Indian Military Academy (IMA), Dehradun, in Dec 2024. Complementing these efforts, 4,000 cadets (2,000 SD and 2,000 SW) gained practical insights through attachment with Military Hospitals for 12 days.

Naval Wing Activities: The NCC's Naval Wing showcased its robust training initiatives through a variety of impactful programs. From 05 Jan to 16 Jan 2024, 200 cadets (175 SW and 25 SD) participated in attachment training at the prestigious Indian Naval Academy, Ezhimala. Maritime skills were further honed through the All India NCC Yacht-

foundation stone was laid by Raksha Mantri in September ing Regatta (AIYR), held at INS Chilka from 14 Oct to 21 Oct 2024, involving 102 cadets (51 SD and 51 SW). Special Yachting Camps were conducted in Dec 2024 at INWTCS in Kochi, Goa, and Vizag for 100 cadets, while Sea Training for 240 SD cadets was organised at Vizag and Mumbai from 11 Dec to 22 Dec 2024. Technical Attachment Camps for 204 cadets (150 SD and 54 SW) were held at Lonavala and Jamnagar from 03 Sep to 15 Sept 2024, complemented by Whaler Sailing Camps under the Most Enterprising Naval Unif (MENU) initiative across 17 NCC Directorates. Besides, in line with the Prime Minister's directive to integrate technology, 58 rowing simulators were made operational, significantly enhancing training capabilities.

> Overseas Deployment: With an aim to evolve cadets into disciplined leaders with maritime expertise and a global outlook, on the international stage, 10 Cadets each were deployed aboard Training Squadron Ships at Kochi. The Spring Term covered Oman, Djibouti, Eritrea, Egypt, and Saudi Arabia (12 Apr to 18 May 2024), while the Autumn Term included Oman, Kuwait, UAE, Iran, and Djibouti (22 Sep to 30 Oct2024).

> Air Wing Activities: On similar lines of Air and Naval wing activities, NCC's Air Wing provided extensive exposure to aviation and Air Force training. Attachment training for 200 SD and SW cadets was conducted at various Air Force Stations and the Air Force Academy, Dundigal. Flying training remained a highlight, with over 3,500 flying hours logged and 4,000 cadets gaining experience on NCC Microlight aircraft from Jan to Oct 2024. Additionally, 35 flying simulators provided advanced, technology-driven training.

Social Service & Community Development Activities Nation-building is a cornerstone of NCC training, focusing on instilling values of civic duty, responsibility, and national pride. Through activities like community service, environmental campaigns, and blood donation drives, cadets are encouraged to actively contribute to society. NCC Cadets actively participated in Swachhta Hi Seva, Ek Pedh Maa Ke Naam, International Day of Yoga, World Environment Day and Vibrant Village Programme

He said a control room has been set up in Srinagar for 24×7 monitoring. 

Adelaide Strikers 143 for 5 (Lynn 88, Zampa 2-29) beat Melbourne Renegades 142 for 9 (Brown 66, Thornton 3-22) by five wickets

hris Lynn unleashed on Melbourne Renegades, powering Adelaide

Strikers to their first BBL win in four games. Moved up from No.3, Lynn dominated the 104-run opening stand with D'Arcy Short that ensured Adelaide's five-wicket win on Thursday night at Marvel Stadium. Lynn belted 88 from just 51 balls, with 10 fours and four sixes, as Adelaide romped to 143 for 5 in 17.1 overs.

It is Lynn's highest BBL score since the 2019-20 tournament and his first halfcentury in this campaign.



Adelaide were second-last before Thursday's game and the badly needed win improved their record to 2-4, while the Renegades are fifth on 2-3. After four overs, Lynn had belted 37 and Short was yet to score, having faced just three balls.

Short finally scored a single in the fifth over and was the first wicket to fall, bowled by Tom Rogers in the 11th over for 27 from 20 balls.

A century went begging for Lynn in the next over when he belted Adam Zampa straight to Laurie Evans at cover. Lynn threw his head back in frustration.
