No timeline can be fixed for AFSPA revocation from J&K: Army Chief

NEW DELHI: Stating that the Armed Forces Special Powers Act (AFSPA) would continue to remain in force in Jamu and Kashmir till the situation improves, Army Chief General Upendra Dwivedi on Saturday said no timeline can be fixed for its revocation.

Speaking at a national television conclave, the Army Chief, according to the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO) said. "The act (AFSPA) will be withdrawn when the Army is convinced that the local police can manage security without military assistance."

He said that while AFSPA could eventually be lifted, there is no specific



timeframe for its removal. Referring to the areas like Doda,

Rajouri, and Kishtwar where terrorism had been contained to an extent that

tourism initiatives, such as bed-andbreakfast accommodations, were being planned, the Army Chief said. "The Mughal Road was also being considered for significant use. However the recent security concerns have led to the induction of 15,000 additional troops in these areas." 

Kashmir received 13 pc of total tourist footfall in J-K from 2021-24

SRINAGAR: Kashmir has received almost 13 percent of the total tourists who visited the Union Territory in the last four years, with the bulk of the share going to the Jammu region, official data suggests.

According to the Economic Survey 2024-25, tabled by the lammu and Kashmir government in the Legislative Assembly, the union territory received a total of 7,49,70,943 tourists from 2021

This figure includes religious tourists – those visiting the Mata Vaishno Devi Shrine in Jammu and the Amarnath Cave Shrine in Kashmir.

The data suggests that out of the 7.49 crore tourists, 6,49,77,187 visited Jammu, while only 99.93,756 visited the Kashmir Valley, with Jammu receiving a share of 86.66 per cent and Kashmir 13.33 per cent.

In 2021, J-K received a total of 1,13,16,534 tourists. Out of this, Jammu received 1,06,50,757, including domestic, foreign, and religious tourists, while Kashmir



got 6,65,777 visitors.

In 2022, the tourist footfall in J-K was 1,88,84,317, out of which 1,62,10,875 visited Jammu, while Kashmir received 26,73,442.

Similarly, in 2023, out of a total of 2,11,80,011 tourists, 1,80,24,176 visited Jammu and

31,55,835 visited Kashmir. In 2024, while 2,35,90,081 tourists visited J-K, Jammu received 2,00,91,379, and Kashmir 34.98.702. In 2024. 5.11.922 vatris visited the Amarnath Cave Shrine in Kashmir, while 94,55,605 yatris visited the Mata Vaishno Devi Shrine in Jammu.

While more domestic tourists visited Jammu, Kashmir received

more foreign tourists in the last four years, the survey said.

The number of foreign tourists in J-K has risen manifold in the last four years — from 1,650 in 2021 to 65,452 in 2024.

The Economic Survey stated that the J-KTourism Department's extensive promotional campaigns, both within and outside J-K, have produced impressive results.

Participation in various national and international events and active digital and social media promotion has significantly increased tourist visits, it said. The 3rd Tourism Working Meeting of the G20,



Take Parliament into confidence: Cong to PM on Trump's India cutting trade tariff claim

NEW DELHI,: The Congress on Saturday asked Prime Minister Narendra Modi to take Parliament into confidence on US President Donald Trump's claims that India has agreed to cut its tariffs.

The opposition party's general secretary, communications, Jairam Ramesh asked whether the interests of Indian farmers and manufacturers are being compromised.

"Commerce Minister Piyush Goyal is in Washington DC to talk trade with the Americans. Meanwhile, President Trump says this...," he said in a post on X, tagging a video of the US president speaking

on trade tariffs. US President Donald Trump said India has agreed to cut its tariffs "way down" as he reiterated his claim that the country charges America massive tariffs that make it difficult to sell products there.



Ramesh said, "What has the Modi Government agreed to? Are the interests of Indian farmers and of Indian manufacturing being compromised? The PM must take Parliament into confidence when it resumes on March 10." Both houses of Parliament will meet on Monday as the second part of the budget session resumes.

ED seizes business jet at Hyderabad airport in money laundering case

jet parked at the Hyderabad airport as part of a money laundering investigation against a Hyderabad-based company and its promoters who allegedly duped numerous investors in a Rs 850 crore Ponzi "scam", official sources said on Saturday.

The money laundering case stems from a Cyberabad police FIR against Falcon Group (Capital Protection Force Pvt. Ltd.), its CMD Amar Deep Kumar and some others, the sources said.

It is alleged that the Falcon Group "collected" Rs 1,700 crore from investors for high returns through a "fraudulent" invoice discounting investment scheme.

Rs 850 crore, out of the total funds, was re-paid leaving a total of 6,979 investors unpaid, according to the sources.

Kumar, the sources said, fled the country using this jet.

He or his company could not be contacted immediately for a response on the charges.

Officials from the ED's Hyderabad office found that the 8-seater business jet 'N935H Hawker 800A' (owned by a company of Kumar) landed at the Rajiv Gandhi International airport located in the Shamshabad area on Friday, the sources told PTI.

A search of the jet, purchased for about USD 1.6 million (about Rs 14 crore) in 2024, was conducted by ED officials on Friday under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) and they also recorded the statement of the crew and some "close associates" of Kumar present there, the sources said.

The business plane, owned by Kumar's private charter company named Prestige Jets Inc, was seized after the search, they said.

The Quran's Infinite Dimensions: Interpreting Divine Wisdom Through Shifting Lenses

"And We sent down to you the Book as clarification for all things and as guidance and mercy and good tidings." (Surah An. Nahl 16:89)

"He it is who has sent down to you the Book; in it are verses that are precise-they are the foundation of the Book- and others ambiguous. As for those in whose hearts is deviation, they will follow that of it which is ambiguous, seeking discord and seeking an interpretation. But no one knows its true interpretation except Allah. And those firm in knowledge say, 'We believe in it; all of it is from our Lord.' And no one will be reminded except those of understanding." (Surah Aal-e-Imran, 3:7)

The Quran, with its boundless layers of wisdom, transcends the limitations of time and space, offering not just intellectual, spiritual, moral and practical guidance but a profound spectrum of legacy that has the power to illuminate the human mind, heart, intellect, soul and spirit and challenge the very fabric of human understanding with boundless enlightenment, wisdom and awe. It is not a static text confined to a single historical moment, but a dynamic and ever-evolving message that speaks to the perennial questions of existence, ethics, and the divine. Its verses, intricately woven with metaphors, paradoxes, and divine wisdom, invite humanity into a dialogue that spans not just across cultures and eras but also within the individual consciousness. The Quran's transcendence is realized in its extraordinary capacity to offer both an inward journey of self-discovery and an outward journey of social and cosmic harmony. It challenges us to confront the deepest questions of our existence while offering profound clarity on issues such as justice, governance, gender, morality and spirituality. The multiplicity of interpretive traditions sur $rounding \, the \, Quran, from \, classical \, tafsir \, to \, modern \, reform is t \, and \,$ feminist exegesis, reveals its timeless relevance, showing how its wisdom can be adapted to the changing needs of society, politics, economics and global challenges. At its core, the Quran represents the ultimate convergence of the spiritual and the intellectual, offering a pathway that is at once timeless and ever-relevant, inviting humanity to seek truth not only in the text but within themselves, and in their relationship with the divine and with one another. From the earliest transmitted interpretations to the gender-sensitive and pluralistic readings of the 21st century, Quranic tafsir reveals a mosaic of approaches that testify to its timeless relevance and universal appeal.

The earliest tafsir emerged in the milieu of the Prophet Muhammad's (pbuh) companions, such as Ibn Abbas, who is often referred to as "Tarjuman al-Quran" (Interpreter of the Quran). This era was characterized by tafsir bi'l-ma'thur, which relied on Prophetic traditions, sayings of the companions, and the occasions of revelation. Such interpretations were deeply contextual, aiming to elucidate verses in light of their immediate historical and linguistic milieu. For instance, the Quranic prohibition against riba (usury) is often contextualized within the exploitative economic practices of pre-Islamic Arabia. Early interpreters emphasized the Quran's ethical stance, portraying these verses as a call for justice and balance rather than merely a legal prohibition. Such insights underscore the Quran's ability to transcend its immediate context, offering universal moral principles.

The classical period of Quranic tafsir, spanning from the 9th to the 13th centuries, represents a zenith of intellectual synthesis. Al-Tabari's monumental Jami' al-Bayan epitomizes this era's reliance on transmitted traditions, offering a meticulous compilation of opinions from the Prophet's (pbuh) companions and successors. In contrast, Fakhr al-Din al-Razi's Mafatih al-Ghayb ventures into rationalist philosophy, astronomy, and metaphysics, reflecting a broader engagement with intellectual currents of his time. A rare insight emerges from Al-Razi's interpretation of Quranic cosmology. For example, his reading of the verse, "And the heavens We constructed with strength, and indeed, We are [its] expander" (51:47), delves into astronomical phenomena, aligning Quranic descriptions with evolving scientific knowledge. Such exegesis showcases the Quran's engagement with reason and its capacity to inspire intellectual exploration beyond its historical confines.

The Sufi tradition brought a transformative lens to Quranic interpretation, emphasizing its esoteric dimensions. Mystical interpreters like Ibn Arabi, Jalal al-Din Rumi and Al-Ghazali viewed the Quran as a living dialogue with divine realities, where the apparent meanings of the verses unveiled profound spiritual truths. Ibn Arabi's interpretation of "And He taught Adam the names-all of them" (2:31) exemplifies the mystical approach. He interpreted the "names" as divine attributes, suggesting that humanity's ultimate purpose lies in reflecting these attributes through spiritual perfection. Rumi, on the other hand, often employed poetry to elucidate Quranic themes. His reflections on the verse "Verily, with hardship comes ease" (94:6) highlight the transformative nature of suffering as a pathway to divine enlightenment. These mystical approaches enrich the Quranic tradition by inviting readers into an intimate relationship with the divine, Al-Ghazali's tafseerAl-Ghazali's most prominent work of tafseer is titled "Al-Mistafa" (holistic approach to Quranic exegesis, blending intellectual rigor with spiritual insight. His work remains a foundational reference for those seeking to understand the Quran not just as a text but as a living guide to personal and societal transformation. His insights into Quranic interpretation are often interwoven within

his broader works on theology, ethics, and mysticism. Al-Ghazali's

tafseer, like his other works, focuses on the internal spiritual and

philosophical meanings of the Quran rather than providing a

detailed, systematic exegesis of the entire text.

The challenges posed by modernity catalyzed a shift in Quranic hermeneutics, with reformist scholars emphasizing the text's dynamic and progressive potential. Muhammad Abduh, Sayyid Qutb, and Fazlur Rahman stand out as key figures in this transformative era. Fazlur Rahman's "double movement" methodology is particularly enlightening. By situating Quranic verses within their historical context and then deriving universal principles, Rahman presented the Quran as both contextually grounded and eternally relevant. His analysis of the verse, "Indeed, Allah commands you to render trusts to whom they are due" (4:58), illustrates the Quran's emphasis on justice and governance, principles that resonate with contemporary notions of ethical accountability. Similarly, Sayyid Qutb's revolutionary exegesis frames the Quran as a guide for societal transformation. His commentary on "Indeed, Allah will

Mystical exegeses highlight the Quran's role as a guide to self-transcendence and divine love. Dynamic Relevance: Reformist readings underscore the Quran's timeless applicability, addressing modern issues like justice and pluralism.

While the works of Persian exegetes share a common goal of elucidating the Quranic text, their methodologies and findings offer distinctive and critical contrasts. For example, while Al-Mizan by Tabatabai is philosophical and intellectual in nature, engaging with Western philosophical thought, Ruh-ul-Ma'ani by Alusi focuses more on reconciling legalistic and mystical interpretations, making it a valuable resource for those seeking balance. Similarly, Baqir's Tafseer-e-Fath stands out for its integration of spiritual, ethical, and legal perspectives, drawing attention to the societal implications of the Quran. In contrast, Nu'mani's

influence of external intellectual traditions on Islamic exegesis. Greek philosophy, Persian mysticism, and Indian metaphysics, among others, have all left their imprints on Quranic interpretation. This synthesis reflects the universality of the Quran and its ability to absorb and transform external knowledge while remaining rooted in its divine essence. It challenges contemporary readers to embrace a broader, more inclusive approach to learning and engagement with the sacred text.

At its core, the comparative study of Quranic tafaseer offers timeless insights into the dynamic relationship between the divine and the human. It affirms that the Quran, as a living text, speaks to every heart and mind, regardless of era or context. Its interpretations, shaped by the diverse intellects and contexts of its interpreters, remind us of the infinite depth and universality

These reformist readings reflect the Quran's adaptability to modern challenges, portraying it as a source of ethical and spiritual resilience.

Scientific Quranic tafaseer across periods reveal a profound interplay between divine revelation and humanity's understanding of the natural world. Early scholars like Al-Biruni and Ibn Sina integrated Quranic reflections with empirical observation, particularly in cosmology and geography, highlighting a synergy between scripture and science. Later classical works, such as Tafsir al-Jassas and Al-Kashaf, included contemplations on natural phenomena like embryology, astronomy, and hydrology, albeit framed within the context of their era's knowledge systems.

The modern era marked a significant shift as thinkers like Muhammad Abduh and Sayyid Qutb emphasized the Quran's alignment with emerging scientific discoveries, showcasing verses on the cosmos, biological processes, and ecological systems as evidence of divine prescience. For instance, the Quran's references to the origins of the universe (Surah Al-Anbiya, 21:30), its expansion (Surah Adh-Dhariyat, 51:47), and the stages of embryonic development (Surah Al-Mu'minun, 23:12-14) have been interpreted as remarkably consistent with modern scientific understandings.

In contemporary times, scholars like Maurice Bucaille analyzed the Quran through a scientific lens, presenting it as prescient and aligning with advanced knowledge in cosmology, biology, and environmental science. Observations of the water cycle (Surah Az-Zumar, 39:21) and ecological balance (Surah Ar-Rahman, 55:7-8) reflect not only an understanding of natural processes but also ethical imperatives regarding sustainability.

While such interpretations demonstrate the Quran's remarkable relevance across ages, they also raise important questions about the limits of aligning divine wisdom strictly with temporal scientific paradigms, emphasizing the need for a balanced, reflexive approach that honors both the text's spiritual essence and its engagement with human intellect.

The late 20th and early 21st centuries have seen the emergence of tafsir that foregrounds inclusivity, gender justice, and interfaith harmony. Scholars like Amina Wadud and Asma Barlas have challenged patriarchal interpretations of the Quran, highlighting its egalitarian ethos. Wadud's reinterpretation of the verse, "And they [women] have rights similar to those [of men] over them according to what is equitable" (2:228), underscores the Quran's affirmation of gender parity. Such readings not only enrich our understanding of the Quran's ethical framework but also provide a counter-narrative to restrictive interpretations. Pluralistic exegeses, as championed by Farid Esack, emphasize the Quran's recognition of religious diversity. His analysis of "For you is your religion, and for me is my religion" (109:6) highlights the Quran's endorsement of peaceful coexistence, offering a compelling vision of interfaith harmony.

Across these interpretive traditions, several rare findings stand out: The Quran's Linguistic Elasticity: Its unparalleled use of metaphors, such as light (nur) and darkness (zulumat), enables interpretations that resonate across intellectual and emotional domains. Reason and Revelation: The Quran's encouragement of rational inquiry, as exemplified by Al-Razi and reformist scholars, bridges the gap between faith and reason. Spiritual Universality:

Al-Tafseer al-Nu'mani emphasizes esoteric spirituality and the metaphysical aspects of the Quran, offering insights that focus on the personal and mystical connection between the believer and the divine. Collectively, these tafaseer offer profound, rare

In contrast, Wahiduddin Khan's Tazkiraul Quran offers spiritual clarity and simplicity, focusing on the Quran's moral teachings and their practical application in daily life. Thanvi's Bayanul Quran stands out for its balanced approach, advocating moderation and ethics in personal and social matters, while Dehlavi's Ruhul Bayaan emphasizes the Quran's theological depth and internal coherence, making a rare contribution to understanding the Quran's literary and rhetorical excellence.

PDP's Para says it fuels fears of demographic engineering

Jammu: Jammu & Kashmir Government on Monday said that it intends to establish satellite township in the Union Territory to check unplanned urban expansion and to meet nousing needs of people.

Replying to a question of MLA Pulwama Waheed-Ur-Rehman Para, Chief Minister, who is in charge of Housing and Urban Development Department, according to the news agency-Kashmir News Observer (KNO) said that "Yes the government intends to establish satellite township in I&K. We want to check the unplanned urban expansion and meet housing needs of the people."

The CM said that the Housing Board has identified 1298.28

kanals of land at nine places in I&K for satellite township in I&K. Of which, 30 kanals have been identified at Padgampura (Pulwama), 200 kanals at Watapora(Bandipora), 85 kanals at Bhalwal (Jammu), 81.48 kanals at Chnagrah (Kathua), 353.35 kanals at Chatterhama(Srinagar), 214 at Bakoora(Ganderbal), 248.65 at Chak Bhalwal (Jammu), 69 kanals at Chowdhai (Jammu) and 16.80 kanals at Kanuyian(Poonch).

Asking supplementary questions, MLA Pulwama Waheedur-Rehman Para said that the idea of township is scary and fuels fears of demographic engineering and environmental disasters.

"The government should come clear on the definition of people of Jammu and Kashmir as it is very vague," he said.

Para said the government's admission about setting up satellite townships is contrary to the CM's earlier statement that no proposal for satellite townships is under consideration.

'69 CCIs sanctioned, 63 established, 6 more being established'

Srinagar: The Jammu and Kashmir government on Saturday said that there are around 2400 children living Child Care Institutes in the region and that all the requisite interventions are being made for the overall development of these children.

Replying to the question of MLA Pampore Justice Hasnain Masoodi, Minister for Social Welfare Sakina Itoo as per the news agency— Kashmir News Observer (KNO), said that the department is committed for welfare of all the children in need of care and protection and children in conflict with law.

"Mission Vatsalya is monitoring and inspecting the existing CCIs and provides all necessary help and assistance as required as per the guidelines of Mission Vatsalva." she said, adding that there are 1796 children in government run Child Care Institutes while 579 are in eight private institutions.

She added that the number of government

run CCI registered under Juvenile justice act 2015 is 69 while NGO run CCI registered under Juvenile justice act 2015 is 58.



Regarding the steps taken to ensure registration of left out institutions to ensure their compliance with law, she said that notice issued to unregistered CCIs Dealing with children in need of care and Protection, with the direction to register the institutions as per sub-section (1) of section 41 of Juvenile Justice (Care & Protection) Act, 2015.

"Subsequently, Circular instructions issued to all District Child Protection officers of 35K to strictly adhere to the procedure prescribed under aforementioned circular and ensure gathering of information pertaining to the unregistered NGOs working for the welfare of children besides ensuring registration of "All un-registered NGOs working for the welfare of Children in the UT of J&K under Mission Vatsalya (erstwhile ICPS) under the provision of sub-section (1) of section 41 of Juvenile Justice (Care & Protection) Act, 2015," she said.

"The Department submits financial proposal to Project Approval Board (PAB), Ministry of Women and Child Development, Government of India every financial year wherein a proposal is submitted to grant approval for setting up of new Child Care Institutions at district level and sub division level, as the case may be," Sakina said.

"Out of 69 Government run CCIs, 63 CCIs have been established and are functional in JBK. 06 CCIs have been approved by the PAB and are under process for establishment," she added.



Mayo Clinic researchers found word recall was enhanced with stimulation of the brain's lateral temporal cortex, the regions on the sides of the head by the temples and ears.

They also Patients recalled more words from a

They also Patients recalled more words from a previously viewed list when low-amplitude electrical stimulation was delivered to the brain.

One patient reported that it was easier to picture

the words in his mind for remembering.
Study author Michal Kucewicz said, "The most exciting finding of this research is that our memory for language information can be improved by directly stimulating this underexplored brain area".

Senior author Gregory Worrell said, "While electrical stimulation of the brain is emerging as potential therapy for a wide range of neurological and psychiatric diseases, little is known about its effect on memory". The team focused on four areas of the brain known to support memory for facts and events that can be consciously recalled.

The memory testing was done with patients undergoing evaluation for surgery to address seizures. These patients agreed to have their memory investigated using the electrodes implanted in their brains for surgical evaluation.

It is common for people with epilepsy to have memory problems because the brain circuits that underlie memory function often are affected by epilepsy. The patients were instructed to read a list of words

-- one at a time -- from a computer screen. Electrical stimulation was applied some of this time

The patients then attempted to freely recall the words in any order.

Among 22 patients, they found enhanced memory performance in the four patients with stimulation of the lateral temporal cortex but not among those

OVERDOSE OF VITAMIN A MAY UP BONE FRACTURE RISK

Over-supplementing Vitamin A in your diet may decrease bone thickness, leading to weak and fracture-prone bones, a new study claims.

Vitamin A found in meat, dairy products and vegetables, is an essential source that is important for growth, vision, immunity and organ function.

The findings showed that mice which were given lower doses of Vitamin A, equivalent to 4.5-13 times the recommended daily allowance (RDA) in humans, showed thinning of their bones in just eight days.

"Overconsumption of Vitamin A may be an increasing problem as many more people now take vitamin supplements. Overdose of Vitamin A could be increasing the risk of bone weakening disorders in humans but more studies are needed to investigate this," said Ulf Lerner, Professor from Sahlgrenska Academy at the University of Gothenburg in Sweden. "In the majority of cases, a balanced

diet is perfectly sufficient to maintain the body's nutritional needs for Vitamin A," Lerner added. Previous studies on mice have shown that short-term overdosing of Vitamin A, at the equivalent of 13-142 times the RDA in people, results in decreased bone thickness and an increased fracture risk after just one or two weeks. However, these studies were

performed with very high doses of Vitamin A, over a short period of

"In our study we have shown that much lower concentrations of Vitamin A, a range more relevant for humans, still decreases rodent bone thickness and strength," Lerner noted.

Researchers suggested that people should be cautious of oversupplementing Vitamin A in their diets



GROUP WORKOUTS, A KEY TO FOLLOW FITNESS GOALS

LONDON: People are more likely to stick to their fitness goals if they workout in groups, according to a study published in the International Journal of Technology Assessment in Health Care.

The study was published after Anglia Ruskin University conducted a research on 18 physically healthy adults walking in groups and compared them to those who either walk alone or do not walk.

The results showed that those who conducted



workout sessions in the group continued with it even after six months.

The World Health Organization also recommends that adults must undertake 150 minutes of moderate aerobic physical activity per week.

Professor Catherine Meads of Anglia Ruskin University said, "Walking in groups is a safe and inexpensive intervention that can be delivered easily and successfully in the community."

DRUG BOOSTS GROWTH IN KIDS WITH DWARFISM

A ground-breaking drug that helps regulate bone development may boost growth rates in children with achondroplasia — the most common type of dwarfism — according to scientists who conducted a global trial. The drug vosoritide was tested in children aged

five to 14 years, according to the research published in the New England Journal of Medicine. According to researchers, achondroplasia is caused

by overactivity of a signal that stops growth, and could be likened to overwatering a plant.

"This drug basically kinks the hose so that the

"This drug basically kinks the hose so that the plant gets the right amount of water and can resume regular growth," said Ravi Savarirayan, a professor at Murdoch Children's Research Institute in Australia.

Achondroplasia is a genetic bone disorder affecting about one in every 25,000 infants. It is caused by a mutation in the FGFR3 gene that impairs the growth of bones in the limbs, the spine, and base of the skull. The most common health complications experienced

by children with achondroplasia are spinal cord compression, spinal curvature and bowed legs. About half of these children will need spinal or other surgery. "This can mean a lot of time away from school as the child recovers and rehabilitates after surgery,

which can affect important social connections," Savarirayan said.

Unlike other treatments — such as growth hormone and limb-lengthening surgery—that focus on symptoms, vosoritide focuses on the underlying cause of achondroplasia and directly counteracts the effect of

the mutation that slows growth.

The study ran over four years across research centres in Australia, France, the UK and the US with 35 children assigned to one of four groups receiving daily subcutaneous doses of the drug in increasing amounts.

The patients' average boost in height to about six centimetres per year was close to growth rates among children of average stature, and the side effects of the drug were mostly mild, said Julie Hoover, an associate

professor at the Johns Hopkins University in the US. "Right now, the results of the study show an impact on growth, and this effect is sustained, at least over nearly four years in this trial," Hoover said.

"The potential long-term benefit will take more time to observe," she said.

The main aims of the trials were to evaluate safety and tolerability of the drug and to determine the best dose for the Phase 3 trials, which are now underway.

The results showed vosoritide was generally well tolerated by patients and demonstrated dose-dependent increases in centimetres grown per year during the first six months, with improvements maintained over the study extension period of a further three years.

On average, participants in the trial grew at a 50 per cent faster compared to baseline with no adverse effects on body proportion. Overall bone age was not accelerated implying that this effect, if sustained long-term might increase final adult height

long-term, might increase final adult height.

"This study is the very first report of a possible disruptive, precision therapy for children with achondroplasia, which we hope will improve their health outcomes and functioning, as well as increase their height and access to their environment," Savarirayan



HEAVY RED MEAT EATERS AT INCREASED RISK OF DEATH

Increasing red meat consumption, particularly processed red meat, is associated with a higher risk of death, researchers warned.

A study published in the journal BMJ shows that replacing red meat with other protein sources, such as eggs and fish, whole grains and vegetables, over time may help you live longer.

For the study, a team of researchers from Harvard University looked at the link between changes in red meat consumption over an eight-year period with mortality rate during the next eight years, starting from 1986 to the end of follow-up in 2010.

They used data for 53,553 US registered female nurses, aged between 30 and 55, and 27,916 male health professionals in the US, aged between 40 and 75, who were free of cardiovascular disease and cancer at the start of the study.

Every four years the participants were given

a food frequency questionnaire (FFQ) where they were asked how often, on an average, they ate each food of standard portion size in the past year. They were then divided into five categories based on their changes in red meat intake.

During the study period, the total number of deaths from any cause reached 14,019 (8,426 women and 5,593 men) and the leading causes were cardiovascular disease, cancer, respiratory disease and neurodegenerative disease.

After adjusting for age and other potentially influential factors, increasing total red meat intake by 3.5 servings a week or more over an eight-year period was associated with 10 per cent higher risk of death in the next eight years.

Overall, reducing red meat intake while eating more whole grains, vegetables or other protein

foods such as poultry without skin, eggs and fish, was associated with a lower risk of death among both men and women.

India favourites but only just against New Zealand in CT final: Ravi Shastri

ormer India head coach Ravi Shastri has picked India as the favourites in Sunday's Champions Trophy summit clash against New Zealand but pointed out that the advantage will be miniscule, given that the Black Caps are a formidable side.

India, who have played all their matches here, stormed into the final with an all-win record, and defeated Australia in the semifinal.

New Zealand, who finished second behind India in Group A after losing their league match, secured their spot in the final with a one-sided win over South Africa in the second semifinal in Lahore.

"If there's one team that can beat India, it's New Zealand," Shastri said in 'The ICC Review'. "So India start as favourites but only just," he said referring to the final, which will be a rematch of the 2000 Champions Trophy title clash, where New Zealand triumphed by four wickets in Nairobi.

The 62-year-old, who has seen both teams evolve over the years, picked four players from the New Zealand squad who could make a difference in the high-stakes final.

He singled out Rachin Ravindra, calling him "immensely talented", Kane Williamson for his "stability and calmness like a saint", and captain Mitchell Santner, whom he described as an "intelligent" leader who can influence the game alongside Glenn Phillips, who could be the X-factor for the team.

Shastri also highlighted Virat Kohli's current form as a potential game-changer, while also acknowledging Williamson's ability to seize crucial moments.

"Now (on) current form, Kohli. When these guys get hot and you let them get their first 10 runs, then they're trouble. Whether it's Williamson, whether it's Kohli," Shastri said.

"So from New Zealand, I would say Williamson. To an extent, Ravindra, he is a fabulous

which is fabulous to see. He's either forward, he's back, he'll cut, he'll sweep it, play the quicks well, and he's got a very good temperament.

"You don't get hundreds in big tournaments like this just like that. You've got to have something up your sleeve, and I think



young player.

"But these guys when they smell the coffee and you let them, in a final, get to that 10-15, then they're doubly dangerous."

Ravindra, at just 25, has already accumulated five centuries in ICC 50-over tournaments -- the youngest to achieve the feat.

"I just like the way he moves in the crease." Shastri said. "There's an element of fluency, he's immensely talented."

Apart from his batting prowess, former skipper Williamson's leadership and calm demeanour make him a vital asset for New Zealand in the final. The veteran has been in red-hot form with scores of 81 against India and 102 in the semifinal versus South Africa.

"He's very stable and there's an element of calmness, a no-nonsense element about him

the way he goes about his job," Shastri said. "He's like a saint, a sage, just sitting, meditating. Lot of people look at the big shots, I look at the way he moves in the crease. There's an

element of fluency.

"It's a joy to watch. And then with their experience, their talent, the volume of runs they've got, doesn't matter what format they play," added Shastri.

Shastri also made special mention of Santner, who has impressed in his first ICC event as New Zealand captain.

"He's an intelligent man. And I think this captaincy suits him," Shastri said. "It just adds that edge to him as a batter, as a bowler,

"So I think it's a smart move by New Zealand opting for that and just the way he goes about his job, like I said, he's a good reader of the game, is an intelligent bloke and should be there for some time for New Zealand."

Shastrialso didn't hold back his admiration for Phillips' ability to turn a match around single-handedly as he also picked him as one of the Player-of-the-Match contenders alongside India's Axar Patel and Ravindra Jadeja.

"Player of the Match, I would go for an all-rounder," he said in The ICC Review. "I'll say Axar Patel or Ravindra Jadeja from India.

"From New Zealand, I think that Glenn Phillips has something up. He might just show flashes of brilliance in the field. He might come and smash a cameo of 40, 50 and probably surprise you by taking a wicket or two."

He also congratulated the U-15 RKFC team for qualifying for the AIFF Youth League.


He said that RKFC provides a significant platform for young players, preparing them for national tournaments. He also stated that the government is focusing on developing more sports grounds to promote athletic activities.
